On March 8, 1978 the educational world and, in a broader sense, our country lost one of its most remarkable citizens. A person of definite convictions, unbounded talents and a superb gift for written and oral expression, Henry Merritt Wriston inspired and raised the sights of every institution or organization that was fortunate enough to claim his attention. Although his achievements ranged far beyond the horizons of higher education, his central dedication was to the academic field because it was here that emerging young men and women had the opportunity to develop their intellectual, moral and spiritual qualities and of attaining the self-discipline that could give continuing focus to their lives.

Henry M. Wriston served as President of Lawrence College from 1925 to 1937 and from here he went on to national and international prominence. Although more than forty years have passed since he walked our campus, his spirit and teachings are ever present, enhanced by a particular affection and pride. He touched the Lawrence community and he cared.



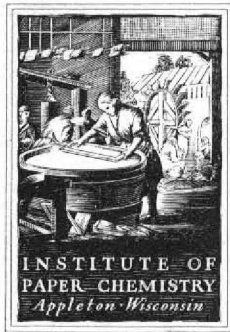

On Friday evening, March 10, a dinner meeting of Corporation members and their spouses was held at the Old Colony House in Newport. Following dinner Thomas J. Watson, Jr., presented a resolution on the death of Dr. Wriston. Those present expressed their concurrence by rising while the resolution was read.

At the formal business meeting of the Corporation the following afternoon, March 11, upon motion by the Senior Fellow, John Nicholas Brown, the Fellows and Trustees unanimously adopted the resolution by a rising vote of respect and instructed me to enter it into the permanent records of the Corporation and to send copies to the members of Dr. Wriston's immediate family. RESOLUTION

on the Death of

President Emeritus Henry Merritt Wriston

Brown University was blessed by the presence of Henry Merritt Wriston on its campus from 1937 until his retirement in 1955 as its President. During this time, Dr. Wriston led a small, struggling New England college to greatness, and the momentum which he gave to Brown has carried the University still higher. Henry Wriston was a rare leader, who by his own excellence was able to strengthen the total Brown University community, not only in actual achievement, but also in our vision and perception of our role in the future.

When he arrived, Brown's direction was uncertain. When he left, our purpose was clear. We were a great university, and with dedicated efforts on the part of the Corporation, the Administration, and the Faculty, we were sure that we would continue to increase our usefulness to the educational community and to enhance our prestige as an institution.

It is very rare that a single individual has a profound effect upon an old and established institution. Henry Wriston had that effect upon Brown. We find ourselves richer for his presence, and we share with his family the sorrow of his passing. All of us who knew him had the privilege of knowing a very great man.
